A LETTER FROM THE NEW PRESIDENT

ell, here it is 2018 and it looks like we are already off to a good start, new faces on the board, and we have a plan. Still in the works are for a spring event, on track for a summer musical, and a lineup for the month of October events. Maybe a one act play or radio show, the summer musical is gearing up for "Helen on 86th Street" and the good news is we have a program for our youth cast, and the bad news... there is no bad news. We have a director and an evergrowing production team with new and old faces.

Sponsorships have been outstanding and my hat is off in thanks to our business community. SSCP owes much of our success for having the right equipment, props, effects, and costumes to through the ads placed in our programs. We will be visiting your business once or twice per year to show how we can partner together and show support for our community.

I think if you envision the mission of ShoeString Community Players, I think we have kept a pretty tight course over the years, however one thing we have lacked is training the next generation. That is going to change next few years and foreseeable future, and we are going to make an investment in our volunteers and community. If it were not for SSCP, and the high schools with Ron Barnett and Tom Weaver, theater would be all but dead, without going to Forest Grove, Portland, New York or Las Vegas. Everybody wants excitement. The fact is that the cost of royalties are rising every year, and the cost to put on these plays is at times challenging and shocking. Sometimes it is a losing proposition if we don't fill the seats. Selling more tickets solves most problems.

A call to action. We also need talent and volunteers. How do you spend your time? Online? Zoning on YouTube videos? Fully engaged participating in community events? It is such a double-edged sword, to participate to make it happen or watch it happen. You could be directing and editing YouTube videos for SSCP. There are so many people that sleep in St. Helens and work elsewhere that they don't even see any of the interworking's of our community. We need people to get out once and a while by participating with the community. It gets better with practice.

How we have tried to be successful, we have been fairly lucky the past few years by providing unique experiences for audiences and one of kind shows that we have showcased in October that coincides with the month-long celebration Spirit of Halloweentown and tourist dollars. We pull it off but still struggle to get people to sign up and volunteer, we need more volunteers. We have so much more that we can accomplish if we get more people to be committed to participate and be in charge of events and activities.

How do we avoid throwing volunteers into the fray with a trial by fire and that is a horrible experience. I know because I have been burned, brushed myself off and gotten on the ride again. Not everybody is wired that way, so you wind up with fewer people wanting to do it again and improve. So now we are putting into place a system where we put interns in with a coach to help them navigate the pitfalls of putting on a show, by working with a director putting on the show.

This is almost a broken record, but I will say it again. There are challenges with booking large, medium, and small sized venues, because we are looking for the most inexpensive route to keep the cost of admission affordable for our community. We earned the name ShoeString, because we do it on a shoestring budget, but we do it with style and make it look great. We really need a permanent

home that accommodate a 100 person dinner theater or a large scale production that can fit 250 people and be within fire code. Anyone taking notes? We need an arts and theater center for our community.

You might be asking yourself why is Brian president of ShoeString, well I ask myself that very question almost weekly if not daily, I have some pretty big shoes to fill in you look at the past 30 plus years. Many of the people that hold my deepest admiration have passed on to that great theater in the sky or moved out of the area to other theater groups or silver screen. There is no business like show business. We need more directors to step up and move forward.




